Course Description: An introductory course to familiarize students with the field of sociology and the scientific study of human society. Includes study of culture, socialization, status and role, small groups, collective behavior, race, social class, social change, and the basic social institutions. Emphasis is given to key sociological perspectives: functionalism, conflict theory, and symbolic interactionism. Prerequisite: None

Student Learning Outcomes: Students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of cultures, countercultures, and subcultures including their basic characteristics and component parts (Demonstrate knowledge of basic facts, concepts, and processes (KA 5))
- 2. Examine the connections between people's cultures and their actions and beliefs (GP 2)
- 3. Evaluate the ability of social groups/organizations to influence social change (Recognize how individuals and groups can effect positive social change (SRA 4))
- 4. Analyze issues and events using social constructs and theoretical perspectives

Preview Quizzes: The purpose of these quizzes is to help you hone in on the important aspects of the chapters, to ensure that students are prepared for class, and to let the professor know which items in the chapters are most confusing to the students. The quizzes are designed to follow the textbook, so you will do best if you have the book open and read along as you complete the quiz. The quizzes appear on Marian Online. **They will be available 2 weeks before they are due and will close at 2:00 pm on Monday**. You can take the quiz up to 10 times. If you are happy with your first score, you do not have to repeat the quiz. If you take the quiz over, only the highest score will count. **Note: Providing other students with answers for the preview quizzes through the reproduction (screen shots, printing quizzes, etc.) is considered academic dishonesty. Reproduction of quiz questions for any reason and by any means is considered to be academic dishonesty. Students found to have engaged in such practices will be subject to university policies regarding academic dishonesty.**

Because of time issues, the first two of these quizzes will be available **after** the first day of class. All other preview quizzes will be due **before** class.

Reading Quizzes: The purpose of these quizzes is to highlight important aspects of the material in the book *Gang Leader for a Day*, to demonstrate an understanding of concepts, and to show the ability to apply sociological concepts to real life situations. The quizzes appear on Marian Online. They will be available 2 weeks before they are due and will close at 8:00 am on the day of class. All answers must define terms, provide examples, explain how the example supports the answer, and must be 5-7 sentences long. *Any answer that is less than 5 sentences will be given a zero regardless of quality or accuracy.*

Because part of the goal of the quiz is to determine whether you understand the concept and its definition all definitions must be paraphrased. No quotations are allowed. It is easy to copy a definition without understanding it. However, it is impossible to paraphrase a definition without showing if the concept is understood. If your definition shows you don't understand the

concept, I can provide you with help. If you quote the definition, I won't know if you understood the concept and, thus, can't help you to understand it.

Participation: Each week, students will be awarded up to 24 points for participation in online discussions. It is not expected, nor is it realistic for students to receive consistent scores of 24. The following is the scale and significance of the number of points.

Each student is expected to start a thread about an aspect of the reading that interests him or her. This post must include a concept from the week's readings and it must be a complex question. Complex questions are those that have many possible answers or whose answer my never be known. For example, "Do you think that Impression Management is the most important aspect of a job interview?" It cannot be a simple question. For example: What is the definition of a norm? or I don't understand the Thomas Theorem, can anyone explain it to me? Questions posed cannot be restatements of questions the professor has posed in the Reading Quizzes. Each student will also reply to at least 3 other students' posts with a post that adds information, provides another perspective, or an original observation. Please do not simply restate a previous student's post or agree with a previous post. Restatements and simple agreements don't deepen the discussion.

So that our online discussion is more like an online discussion than a "read if you want" list of comments, you will be required to post on 3 different days. You will start a thread on Monday or Tuesday and then reply to others' posts on two non-consecutive days between Tuesday and Sunday. You are welcome to post on more than 3 days during the week, but 3 days a week is the minimum.

Every Day Sociology: Unlike many subjects, sociology is easily visible once one knows what to look for. Each week, there will be an assignment that requires students to observe sociological concepts in his or her everyday life. Students should be prepared to present a meaningful answer to the questions labeled "Every Day Sociology" on Marian Online.

Papers: Each paper will provide students with a chance to explore a sociological concept in deeper way. Be sure that you are answering the correct question for the paper.

Paper 1 – Questions (these can only be used for Paper 1) Answer only 1 of the following:

- 1. Choose a person in the book *Gang Leader for a Day* and explain a situation in which that person performs strategies of Impression Management. Be sure to define the term, explain why he or she performs Impression Management and how successful you believe he or she is in his or her performance.
- 2. Explain how members of the Robert Taylor Homes try to create collective consciousness within their community. Be sure to define the term and analyze the method used and the extent to which their efforts are successful.
- 3. Choose a situation in the book *Gang Leader for a Day* that exemplifies the Thomas Theorem. Be sure to define the term and explain why the situation is a good example of the theorem.
- Paper 2 Questions (these can only be used for Paper 2) Answer only 1 of the following:
 - 1. Choose a person in the book *Gang Leader for a Day* and show how that person's experience disproves the Just-World Hypothesis.
 - 2. Some people in the US use the Culture of Poverty Theory to explain the poverty in the Robert Taylor Homes. Explain why this theory does not explain poverty in the Robert Taylor Homes.
 - 3. Explain how the structural issues in the Robert Taylor homes disenfranchise the people who live there.
- Paper 3 Question (these can only be used for Paper 3) Answer only 1 of the following:
 - 1. Analyze the Robert Taylor Homes using Resource Mobilization Theory.
 - 2. Use the Tragedy of the Commons to explain the Robert Taylor Homes.
 - 3. Explain the presence of drug sales in the Robert Taylor Homes using the Structural Strain Theory.

General Paper Requirements:

- Each paper must be 2-3 full pages. One and a half pages is not the same as 2 full pages. One inch margins, double spacing, and a 12 point font must be used.

- No quotations are allowed. 5 points per quotation will be deducted from your paper score if any quotations appear.

- All papers must be written in essay form, which means they have to have an introduction, body, and conclusion,

indented paragraphs without an extra return between paragraphs, be in paragraph form without bullets or subsection headings.
Any plagiarism in the paper will result in a zero for the entire paper.

Papers must be uploaded to Marian Online by the time and date found on Marian Online 2. No late papers will be accepted for any reason whatsoever.

A Note on E-mailing and Uploading Work: Technology is wonderful, but it doesn't always work the way in which we want. If Marian Online is not allowing you to upload work, feel free to e-mail work (<u>mmcarlson11@marianuniversity.edu</u>). When submitting assignments through e-mail, it is your responsibility to ensure that the professor has received the assignment or paper.
